Grass, weeds and overgrown vegetation Ordinances

According to the City's CODE OF ORDINANCES : Section 6-1009.1 through Section 6-1009.6, grass, weeds, or other overgrown vegetation higher than one foot on average is declared to be a nuisance. The ordinance also states that any property owner or occupant of the property that allows the property to serve as a breeding place for trash and litter or as a fire hazard is to be declared a nuisance. Any individual who fails to resolve the issue within 10 days of notice of noncompliance will be guilty of a misdemeanor. The City may remove weeds, overgrown vegetation either by the use of a city crew or designated contractor and the cost will become a lien upon the property and collected in the same manner as municipal taxes. The cost of such action by the city is as follows: \$100 per lot, 1/2 acre or less; \$175 per lot, 1/2 acre to 2 acres; \$250 per lot, 2 acres to 5 acres; \$250 per lot, 5 acres and over, plus \$100 per hour; or any contractor costs incurred by the city to correct the nuisance lot in addition to the cost of mailings. If an owner or occupant of a property believes they are unable to pay to have the grass, weeds, or overgrown vegetation removed, he or she may ask the City of Marion for assistance.

A voucher program, administered by a seven-member committee, is available for reviewing requests for assistance by low-income persons.

Good Morning...Raspberries & Thyme!

You might be inclined to ask "what kind of restaurant doesn't serve fried food, pre-made fast food, or 'doctored-up' canned food", and to answer that question, look no farther than **<u>Raspberries & Thyme</u>**.

Located at 329 North Main Street in downtown Marion, this charming little café, opened March 8th of 2017, is the fruition of three and one half years of painstaking attention to detail evident in the ambience (somewhat Bohemian and definitely nostalgic), the table settings, the selection of reading materials strategically placed to invite you to sit and browse, and most importantly, the fare.

Maggie McCullough, Dusty Smith, Bob George and Brent Ard melded their individual talents, ranging from expert craftsmanship in woodworking and interior design, to horticulture, and many years of navigating the ins and outs of meal preparation. They turned what originated, in 1901, as



a building leased by the United States Postal Service come Planters Bank, then Horinbein's Ladies Dress Shop, followed by other businesses, into an atmosphere teeming with memorabilia that instantly piques your interest while massaging your senses with comfort and curiosity. The exposed original brick wall on the north side of the building and the beautiful cast-molded ceiling with bronzed effect are noteworthy highlights of extensive hours of physical labor poured into this project.

Maggie and Bob are the "chefs du jour" with a flair for creating the perfect artisanal experience. Both possess intimate knowledge of the food industry, having worked as either personal chefs and/or in venues serving the public. They use only fresh produce and Boar's Head meats, cheeses, and condiments. Their pastries, breads, desserts and salad dressings are made from scratch. Their coffee

comes as whole beans from Java Estate Roastery near Wilmington, and is ground fresh daily. The menu changes seasonally, and boasts new weekly features, but customers have declared favorites such as the Quiche Lorraine and the French Dip Roast Beef Sandwich. And who can resist a little sweet treat such as Mag-



gie's famous lemon squares, blueberry muffins, or brownies laced with Amaretto or Kahlua, not to mention the cheesecake which openly defies resistance.



Raspberries & Thyme is open Monday-Thursday from 7:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. offering seated meals and take-out (pick up only, call (843) 245-2246. They also offer catering and arrangements can be made to host small events or private dinner at the café, with advance notice. For Bob and Maggie, Raspberries & Thyme is their opportunity to introduce our community to a "palatable art form" that will delight your senses and inspire you to return for the next "canvas".
