#### 'Shred Day' set in Marion

Once the April 15th tax day deadline has passed, along with the rush to gather receipts and documents, and the proper forms are completed and filed, comes the question of what to do with old tax forms and documentation.

The Marion Chamber of Commerce has a solution to any confidential document storage problem, giving its members, the local business community and individuals an opportunity to clear out old paper files.

Bring old documents from your home or business to be securely disposed of on Wednesday, April 20, from noon until 3 p.m. when the Chamber conducts its first "Shred Day" in the parking lot behind Baxley Hardware. Cintas, a company that oversees the shredding and disposal of all types of documents, will have a secure shredder set up in that location.

This project is sponsored by Ashley Brady at First Charter Company and Stacy Smith at Wheeler Street Package. There is no fee for the service, but the Chamber will accept donations for its 2011 Education Programs, Executive Director Judy Johnson said.
