Making Marion Grow: New Marion Community Garden kicks off first growing season

It's that time of the year again! The days are getting longer, the birds are singing in the trees, and the flowers are beginning to bloom. Yes, its Spring! Some people have already ordered their seeds and are planning their backyard gardens; and, so are we!

The newly revamped Marion Community Garden is operating in full gear to get ready for this growing season. CommonHealth Community Gardens is a non-profit organization working to establish community gardens in rural South Carolina. On April 13 the group, spearheaded locally by Sarah Allen-Gerald will officially open the Marion Community Garden to local residents and agriculture enthusiasts. The new garden is boasting 10 raised beds that will be rented to individuals and families who want and need inexpensive, healthier produce.



The goal of the community garden is to create a space where members of the Marion community have access to more knowledge and resources that enable them to produce their own food. Volunteers can enjoy the fresh air and relaxing environment, while growing food for local charities and the Marion Farmers Market. The garden will also be host to workshops, bringing in expert gardeners from all over the state, educating growers in the Marion community on planting, harvesting, and eating healthy, local food.

On April 13, from noon-4 p.m., CommonHealth Community Gardens is inviting any Marion resident interested to attend the grand opening at the garden on North Withlacoochee Avenue, near the Marion Hike and Bike Trail. Have you shopped Marion lately?

Historic Marion Revitalization Association, Olde Towne Marion, hopes to launch, in the next six weeks, its own version of a "shop local" program.

Marion's "MOM's Buy Local" is one way to show the locally-owned businesses that they have our collective support. Instead of shopping in Horry or Florence Counties, or some other locale, when at all possible, SHOP MARION! Instead of ordering online, BUY LOCAL! Instead of supporting chains, SHOP MARION business owners! MOM's (Merchants of Marion) Buy Local program is designed to keep our locally owned and operated businesses near our back doors. With more details to come in the next few weeks, look for ways to support our local merchants. A national movement touting the same idea, the 3/50 project, asks shoppers to think about which three local shops they would miss if they were to go out of business. (That's the 3.) Then shoppers are to decide to spend \$50 each month in those businesses. (That's the 50.) According to statistics on the 3/50 website, for every \$100 spent in locally owned and operated stores, \$68 returns to the community. Spending with a national chain only returns \$43 per \$100 spent. The idea of picking three stores and spending \$50 a month in them, and encouraging your friends to do the same, makes a positive impact on the local economy. Olde Towne Marion's "MOM's Buy Local" program is sure to inspire us all to spend more locally and less elsewhere!

City honors employees, others at annual banquet

On March 19, City of Marion employees and their guests, elected officials and other community members attended and were honored at the annual City of Marion Employee Banquet.

One of the highest honors of the night went to Glenn Bridgers as the **Employee of the Year**. The award recognizes one City Employee who excelled in his or her work in the past year, Mayor Rodney Berry said in making the presentation. A committee is appointed by the Mayor to receive nominations from Department Heads for the award and then members select the employee they believe has made the most significant contributions to the City. The award was started by former Mayor T. Carroll Atkinson, Jr. to recognize an employee for outstanding service.

According to information from the Street Department Supervisor Ronnie Sanders, Glenn, shown at right with Mayor Berry, is known for his quiet demeanor and friendly smile. "There is no job too large or too small for him to tackle. From cutting grass, manhandling the scarecrows on Main Street or decorating for Christmas, which includes being run ragged by the decorating divas at City Hall, he is willing to do whatever it takes to get the job done," Sanders said.

"Glenn doesn't know the meaning of the word quit and he did not allow the Street Depart-

ment to miss a beat when Ronnie was out on medical leave," Berry added.

Kicking off the night's awards was the **Firefighter of the Year Award**, presented by Fire Chief

The **Outstanding Police Officer Award**, presented by Capt. Cindy Barr, was given to Anthony Bacchuss, shown below with Capt. Barr.

Bacchuss returned to the Marion Police Department in November 2011. He has committed his life to Law Enforcement, Barr said, and takes the initiative to work not only for the community but *with* the community to help prevent crimes. Barr, began working with the department in July 2011 and has proven himself to be a dedicated, respectful and committed officer, Chief Gray wrote in his award letter. Assistant Fire Chief Chris McKenzie, who became a volunteer firefighter in 2007, was appointed as Assistant Chief in February 2012. He joined the Fire Department with more than 20 years experience in emergency services, including firefighting, law enforcement and paramedic.

Josh Brown, Fire Department Engineer, is a Firefighter/EMT as well as a resident Fire Marshall; and Ranger Miller, a volunteer firefighter.

Police Lt. Tony Flowers, who has been an integral part of the Department, quickly being promoted to Training Officer. Lt. Flowers serves as an Investigator and was named Officer of the Year in 2008.

Police Sgt. Keith McNeil came to the City and graduated from the Police Academy in 2007. He was the recipient of the Police Chief's Award for 2009, and along with PFC Chris Hucks, thwarted an attempted bank robbery in 2011. Sgt. McNeil also received the Chief's Award for 2011.

Sherry Ransom, a Crossing Guard at Easterling Primary School; and Hezekiah Brown, Sanitation Department employee. Hezekiah is a dedicated employee, helping to keep Marion clean each week day. He was named Employee of the Month for city in February 2012 and February 2013.

Quickly following the April 15th tax day deadline is the need to destroy all those receipts, documents and older tax forms.

The Marion Chamber of Commerce has a solution to any confidential document storage problem, giving its members, the local business community and

For the third year in a row, the Cintas company will come to Marion and accept your home or office documents and then securely dispose of them when the Chamber conducts its "Shred Day" in the parking lot behind Baxley Hardware.

Cintas, a company that oversees the shredding and disposal of all types of documents, will have a secure shredder set up in that location.
