

The Poker Run around the city will be a terrific fun-filled way to end the summer with a bang and serve as a fundraiser for civic groups. Oh, and bicycles are welcomed as entries, too, event organizer Steve Pool said. The 1st Great American Golf Cart Poker Run is designed to be a community-wide event, bringing attention to



downtown Marion. The event is designed as a way to have fun on a Saturday, to help promote businesses and civic groups, to raise money for

area organizations, to show our American pride as we decorate our rides in red, white and blue, and as a way to have a good time without traveling out of town. Visitors are welcome!

The Eloise Grice and Watsonia Recreation Centers are available for those who might not otherwise have a cool place to go during the day. Individuals can enter during business hours for cold water, restrooms and air conditioning. The centers also offer activities for seniors and children and residents are welcome to bring a book or project from home.

Sales Tax Holiday coming up!

The 2010 state sales tax holiday weekend is set for Friday, Aug. 6 through Sunday, Aug. 8. During this time, the 6 percent state sales and use tax, and any applicable local sales and use tax, will not be imposed on clothing, clothing accessories, footwear, school supplies and calculators, computers, printers and printer supplies, computer software and bath wash clothes, blankets, bed spreads, bed linens, sheet sets, comforter sets, bath towels, shower curtains, bath rugs and mats, pillows, and pillow cases.

The sales tax holiday, however, does not apply to jewelry, cosmetics, eyewear, wallets, watches, furniture, rental of clothing or footwear, items for use in a business, or items placed on layaway or similar deferred payment and delivery plans.

Heed the warning!

Hefty fine awaits those who break handicapped parking rules

Don't do it! It's not worth it!

Wanna' park in that clearly marked handicapped parking space that appears to be closer to the door of a business or office?

Think you really don't want to walk a little farther? Think again!

Do you have \$2,105 or 30 days to spare? That is the fine for parking in a marked handicapped parking space without the proper credentials. Misuse of handicapped parking spaces by able drivers is a scurrilous practice.

The state is instituting new rules to crack down on it and the Marion Chief of Police is warning citizens and those who visit Marion that the rules will be enforced. The S.C. Department of Motor Vehicles has begun issuing new placards and license plates for the disabled.

The biggest change will be in the hanging placards dis-

abled drivers and passengers place on their rearview mirrors. New placards will have photos and a certificate verifying the eligibility of the holder. Existing ones, which don't have the photo, are good until they expire or until Dec. 31, 2012, whichever comes first. All residents currently holding a South Carolina handicap placard may continue to use their current issue until it expires or until December 31, 2012, whichever comes first.

Once the placard is expired, residents will have to re-certify their disability with the South Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles before receiving one of the new South Carolina issued, photo-bearing handicap parking placards.

Charge for this will be a mere \$1. The changes are an effort to prevent the illegal use of handicapped placards by able-bodied residents.

S.C. Forestry Grant to help city take down, prune problem trees

The City of Marion has been awarded a \$20,400 grant, part of a grant awarded to the S.C. Forestry Commission through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. Of that amount, \$16,000 will be used for pruning and removing hazardous trees and \$4,400 for replanting trees in the city.

In the coming weeks signs will appear on the trees selected to be removed or pruned. Streets having trees that will be removed include Godbold, Presbyterian, Jones, Arch and Manning. Anyone with questions about the work should call Alan Ammons at 423-5961.

Stay safe! Fire Department offers grilling safety tips

Fire in the grill, under the dogs and burgers, is a welcome sight at the family cookout. But fire anywhere else can make your summer barbecue memorable for all the wrong reasons!

The Marion Fire Department offers the following safety tips for propane and charcoal grills.

First: Propane and charcoal grills should only be used outdoors. The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.

Keep children and pets away from the grill area.

Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup.

Never leave your grill unattended. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal by using newspaper as a fuel. If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.

When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing of them in a metal container.

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using your propane grill for the first time each year.

A light soap and water solution applied to the hose will quickly reveal escaping propane by releasing bubbles.

If you determine your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame: Turn off the gas tank and grill.

If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department.

Do not attempt to move the grill.

Only use equipment bearing the label of a recognized testing laboratory. Follow the manufacturers' instructions on how to set up your grill and how to maintain it.

Never store propane gas tanks in buildings or garages. If you store a gas grill inside during the winter, disconnect the tank and leave it outside.

If you have a grill fire, immediately move a safe distance from the fire and call 911.

Don't forget: City of Marion firefighters will come and install free smoke detectors in your home if necessary. Visit the department on Bond street for details.
