



As we approach the holidays I thought I would share some home safety tips for the season: Be sure to lock all doors and windows when you leave the house, even for a few minutes. When leaving home for an extended period, have someone watching your home and collecting mail, newspapers and parcels. Set indoor and outdoor lights on automatic timers. Leave a radio or television on so the house appears occupied. Large displays of gifts should not be visible through doors and windows. Do not signal criminals that you have purchased or received big ticket items by placing boxes on the street for pick up. Be aware that criminals sometimes pose as couriers delivering gifts.

Remember people prey on our generous spirits during the holidays, so be cautious when donating to charities. It is often best to stick with recognized charities.
