Have perspective, vision, character, Senator tells Chamber members

T. Carroll Atkinson III is the 2012 recipient of the Marion Chamber of Commerce's Community Service award, given at the Chamber's annual meeting on Jan. 23.

Atkinson, shown at right, a lifelong resident of Marion County, is a Marion High School graduate, Marion businessman and has served as Probate Judge since 1987. The annual recipient of the award is given \$250 by the Chamber to donate to the charity of his or her choice. The award has been given by the Chamber since 1979 and in 1980, Atkinson's father won the award.


Sen. Yancy McGill was guest speaker at the event, which highlights the Chamber's accomplishments for the year and recognizes incoming and outgoing Chamber Board members and President. McGill, who has served in the state Senate since 1989 is up for reelection this November. The district McGill represents, before redistricting, included portions of Marion County and McGill said he feels at home visiting here.

City selects two officers as Employees of the Month

The City of Marion selected two police officers as the December 2011 Employees of the Month. PFC Christopher Hucks and Sgt. Keith McNeil (left to right above) responded to an attempted bank robbery on Dec. 29, 2011.

Because of their quick thinking and rapid response, the suspect was taken into custody before leaving the bank.

Hucks, going through a Marion County Central Dispatch telecommunicator, communicated with one of the bank's tellers by telephone.

With the help of the teller and dispatcher, he was able to positively identify the suspect. Then, once McNeil arrived on scene, the two were able to safely arrest the suspect.

"Their quick thinking and teamwork



resulted in a successful arrest with no one being injured," said Marion Police Chief Jim Gray.

McNeil graduated from the S.C. Criminal Justice Academy in 2007, and was the recipient of the Chief's Award for 2009.

He is the Delta Shift supervisor. Mc-Neil has a positive attitude, a strong work ethic, and a demeanor that is personable and professional.

Hucks was originally hired by the City of Marion Police Department in February 2008. He left Marion in 2009 to work as a police officer for the Town of Aynor and returned to Marion in February 2010.

Hucks is assigned to Delta shift. He is well respected by his peers and in the community.

Mayor Rodney Berry and Council members recognized McNeil and Hucks for their Dec. 29 efforts during the Jan. 10 Council meeting.

They were thanked for their commitment to serving the citizens and visitors of the City of Marion.

Swamp Fox Chili Cook-off set to torment, tempt taste buds

The third annual Swamp Fox Chili Cook-off and benefit, created by local businessman Steve Pool, will be on East Court and Dozier Streets in downtown Marion on Feb. 25. Taste buds will be tormented and tempted when tasters sample, and cast ballots for, their favorite home-cooked chili.

Beginning at noon, the voting and chili sampling will continue until a winner is announced and the last cup of chili is consumed. Chili challengers should sign up now, Pool said.

There is no entry fee, but registration is necessary.

The success of the annual event, which brought about 1,800 people



through the city in 2011, is measured in "smiles, positive attitudes and requests for similar community events to be created," Pool, owner of Accent Signs And Promo-

tions (ASAP), said.

Competitors are responsible for purchasing their ingredients, cooking and keeping their chili hot for the competition. Each entry must provide five gallons of chili. All information is included in the online entry form, available at www.swampfoxchilicookoff.com.

Also, individuals and businesses are invited to help sponsor the event and will get free tickets to the cook-off, have their names included on a T-shirt and mentioned in other cook-off promotions.

Tickets to attend the cook-off are available from various Marion County nonprofits. Group members sell the tickets and keep the \$8 per ticket fee, for a 100-percent profit as a fundraiser, Pool explained. The second annual Historic Marion RunFest will be conducted during the Celebrating Francis Marion Days, with races starting at the Historic Marion Opera House on Saturday, Feb. 25.

Beginning at 9 a.m. are the 5K Cub Run/Walk, 10K Mayor's Run/Walk, and 10-Mile Swamp Fox Challenge. Beginning at 11 a.m is a Tot Trot, 50yard dash, and then at 11:30 is the 1-Mile Church Challenge.

All courses are USATF certified and described as "very flat and fast." All runners will run concurrently through the city's Historic District and residential areas. Race Management Systems (RMS Sports) will manage the race and direct the running. RMS is a nationally recognized sports management company that has been producing running events for more than 28 years.

Mail in registrations must be mailed by Feb. 18. Registration resumes at 6 a.m. on Race Day. ChronoTrack timing, featuring the disposable D-tag, will be used.
