Swamp Fox Higher Ed Center ready to serve area students

Francis Marion University, Coastal Carolina University, Florence-Darlington Technical College and City of Marion officials signed a memorandum of understanding Nov. 30 announcing a partnership that forms the Swamp Fox Higher Education Center in Marion.

Operating out of the C.D. Joyner Fine Arts Center, beginning this month, the Swamp Fox Higher Education Center is an opportunity for students to continue their education without having to travel too far from home. The partnership is a fine example of several entities coming together to help better the educational opportunities for those in the area, City of Marion Mayor Rodney Berry said.

Coastal Carolina University has a cohort in its Educational Leadership master's degree program underway in Marion, with students from Dillon and Marion County enrolled.

This program has moved its classes into the Center and the group's next class, offered through the Center, begins this month. The program and the cohort in Marion have been highly successful, Dr. Linda May, program director said.

"It's a great bunch of teachers pursuing their master's degrees. Another cohort will begin in the Fall 2011 and we'll begin recruiting for that soon."

A cohort is a group of students who go through the three-year program together, creating a professional learning community, May said. The program has two years of class work and a one-year internship, May added. Francis Marion University will begin recruiting for its RN to BN program and officials say they hope to offer classes in January, if the interest is there for it.

University officials conducted an information and interest meeting in the Marion County Medical Center in December. For information about the RN to BN program, where registered nurses earn their bachelor's degree, contact Regina Smeltzer at (843) 661-1689 or rsmeltzer@fmarion.edu.

FMU's Coordinator of Continuing Education, Suzan Orrico, said other non-degree earning programs will be offered at the Higher Ed Center, such as Business 150, Fundamentals of Business, and Entrepreneurship Training for Unemployed Adults. *Call Orrico at (843) 661-1283 or by e-mail her at*

Vice President for Academic Affairs at FDTC, Dr. Dale Doty, said once the school has gauged student interest, it will begin to offer classes in the Center.

Catching up with Judy Cooper

New for 2011: The City of Marion is proud to feature a city retiree in each monthly edition of the Swamp Fox Scene. Our list of retirees is long and distinguished, and we have chosen to start with a friendly face that many residents will remember from our Water Department: Mrs. Judy Cooper.

Judy Cooper came to work for the City of Marion in August 1973 as a cashier at City Hall. At that time, she was responsible for collecting payments on water bills, taxes and other over-the-counter payments to the City.

Several years later, Judy was promoted to the position of Billing Clerk for the Water Department. She became responsible for billing every water account in the City of Marion, both residential and commercial, posting water payments, keeping up with industrial usage, making cut-off lists, filing monthly reports and many other administrative duties.

She frequently stayed late at the office at the time of monthly cut-offs for the Water Department in order to give delinquent customers the opportunity to come and pay bills so their service could be reconnected. She also often filled in when one of the cashiers in the front office or dispatchers in the Police Department was out for any reason.

Judy Cooper was named Employee of the Year in 1990 and she retired

from her city service in May 2003.

"I loved my job with the City, and enjoyed helping our customers," Judy

said, fondly remembering her working days. "I always tried to do my best in what I did."

Judy has been a resident of Marion for the past 40 years and is married to George



Cooper, a retired electrician. They have three children, Greg, Randy and Debra; eight grandchildren and three greatgrandchildren. Judy is President of Lodge 122 Woodmen of the World and a member of Grace Community Church, where she serves as Music Director. Even in retirement, Judy remains busy. She is employed part-time with Florence School District 1 as a proctor for GED testing. When she is not working, Judy said she likes to spend time with her grandchildren and great-grandchildren, volunteering with her church, visiting old friends and shopping.

FROM THE MAYOR TO YOU

Years ago I heard a pastor preach about the importance of staying in the present, looking to the future and not dwelling too often in the past. He used the illustration of a car, explaining there is a reason why the front windshield is so big. If the driver focuses too often on the little rear view mirrors, and not the big front windshield, then the driver is going to run into problems, literally!

I believe in the pastor's message but want to take the opportunity for a brief moment to look in the rear view mirror. Because of the support of the Marion City Council and the support of our citizens, our city has taken some giant steps in 2010. Despite a challenging economy recognized by our entire country, the City of Marion has managed to pull off some major feats.

First was our (by way of referendum) transfer of the water and sewer system. This was a long drawn out process by design. It was a major decision where no stone could be left unturned. The end re-

sult was Grand Strand Water & Sewer Authority paying off the more than \$11 million city debt, with a payout of \$2.6 million. The city also receives a monthly franchise fee. Furthermore, citizens got a rate reduction and a guarantee that after two years our rates can not go up any more than the Authority's other service areas. Finally, I think everyone has recognized the amount of effort and money Grand Strand has invested in elevating our systems to first class.

Secondly, we changed our trash service. Though our former sanitation company did a good job, American Waste Systems offered our city a significant savings that allowed us to prevent an increase in rates. The company also opened an office in Marion and hired local folks. Through their creativity with the pink roll carts, citizens contribute to cancer research at no extra cost.

And I saved the best for last! In December we announced and signed a memorandum of understanding with Francis Marion University, Coastal Car-

olina University, and Florence Darlington Technical College. This equates to classes being offered by all three institutions right here in Marion in our CD Joyner Facility. This is an initiative that I believe will evolve into something big for our entire region. We will be forthcoming with all developments as they happen.

Now that we've glanced briefly in the rear view mirror, I'm very excited to turn to our front windshield. I'm looking forward to exploring with Council and our citizens the opportunities of 2011. Many municipalities and organizations will rest on their laurels and say now is not the time to make moves. Often, statements like this are due to unwillingness to put forth the effort to find the right opportunities. There are always opportunities for those who diligently pursue them.

I trust that each one of you will physically, mentally and prayerfully prepare yourself for the blessings that await you in this New Year.

Follow these precautions to prevent home fires

News from and about the City Fire Department

Heating equipment is a leading cause of home fire deaths each year. The City of Marion Fire Department personnel offer the following safety tips and precautions to help prevent heating fires from happening this winter.

Be Warm & Safe this Winter

- ⇒ Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, such as a furnace, fireplace, wood stove or portable space heater.
- ⇒ Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
 - ⇒ Never use your oven to heat your home.
- ⇒ Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year.
- ⇒ Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- ⇒ Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- ⇒ Make sure a fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
 - ⇒ Test smoke alarms monthly.

- ⇒ I will not encourage anything that would endanger the athletes.
- \Rightarrow I will teach my child to play by the rules and to resolve conflicts peacefully.
- ⇒ I will demand that my child treat others with respect.
- ⇒ I will teach my child that doing one's best is more important that winning.
- ⇒ I will offer praise for competing fairly and trying hard.
- ⇒ I will never ridicule or yell at my child or others for a mistake or losing.
- \Rightarrow I will emphasize skill development and practice and de-emphasize games and competition, especially in the younger age groups.
 - ⇒ I will promote the emotional and physical well-being of the athletes.
 - ⇒ I will respect the officials and coaches and their authority and decisions.
 - ⇒ I will demand a sports environment free from drugs, tobacco and alcohol.
- ⇒ I will refrain from coaching, unless I am one, my child or others during games and practices.
- ⇒ I will inform the coach of any physical disability or ailment that could affect the safety of my child or others.
