Be Safe This Winter:

Follow these precautions to prevent home fires:

Heating equipment is a leading cause of home fire deaths each year. The City of Marion Fire Department personnel offer the following safety tips and precautions to help prevent heating fires from happening this winter:

- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, such as a furnace, fireplace, wood stove or portable space heater.
- > Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Have heat equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year.
- Make sure a fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashers should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container in a safe distance away from your home.
- Remember turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- > Test smoke alarms monthly.

Below are 17 tips to help you be a better spectator.

- I will not force my child to participate.
- I will remember that children play to have fun.
- I will learn the rules of the game and the league policies.
- I and my guests will be positive role models and encourage sportsmanship.
- I and my guests will not engage in any kind of unsportsmanlike conduct.
- I will not encourage anything that would endanger the athletes.
- I will teach my child to play by the rules and to resolve conflicts peacefully.
- I will demand that my child treat others with respect.
- I will teach my child that doing one's best is more important that winning.
- I will offer praise for competing fairly and trying hard.
- I will never ridicule or yell at my child or others for a mistake or losing.
- I will emphasize skill development and practice and de-emphasize games and competition, especially in the younger age groups.
- I will promote the emotional and physical well-being of the athletes.
- I will respect the officials and coaches and their authority and decisions.
- I will demand a sports environment free from drugs, tobacco and alcohol.
- I will refrain from coaching, unless I am one, my child or others during games and practices.
- I will inform the coach of any physical disability or ailment that could affect the safety of my child or others.


Happy New Year
