Filing opens January 14th for Board of Education elections;

The Board of Election for seats in Districts 2, 6 and 7 will be held on Tuesday, April 12th. The state's new Voter ID law requires that each voter has an identification card with a photograph of the voter on it. Filing for candidates begins Thursday, Jan. 14th at noon and closes on Friday, Feb. 12th at noon. The last day to register to vote in the April election is March 12th. To find out more about having a proper ID to vote, visit the Marion County Voter Registration and Election Commission at 137 Airport Court off East U.S. Highway 76 or call Teresa Moody at 423-8268.

Additionally, political signs may only be displayed on private property. City ordinances prohibit the placement of signs on public property, including the right of way.

Signs picked up for being improperly posted may be collected at the Marion Fire Department on Bond Street and can be claimed by candidates.

So this is a time for them to come out, socialize and have a good meal served by the Marion Police Department and the Chief of Police," Tennie said.

When someone comes in as an investment group and they are spending their own money to invest in this. I was very excited because I knew something would happen," Mayor Davis stated.

The group is called 1108 North Main Street Marion LLC, which is the physical address of the building.

"It may be a combination, a nursing home or assisted living. They came in; they bought the building with their own money. They talked about how they wanted to help improve the City of Marion by providing at least 100 jobs."

Right now the group haven't decided on what it will be and there is no date when the project will begin.

Senior Bingo


