Council accepts administrator's resignation

Fire Chief, others promoted

On June 22, during a called City Council meeting to approve the city's budget, Marion City Council members voted to promote Alan Ammons to the position of City Administrator.

The position became open when council accepted the resignation of Bob Anderson, administrator from March 2009-June 25, 2010. Anderson announced he had accepted an offer to serve as town administrator in East Jordan, Michigan.

Ammons, who became the administrator effective immediately, continues to be the city's building inspector. Trey Cooper, assistant fire chief since his hire in 2007, was promoted to Fire Chief effective immediately.

In other business, the city approved its 2010-2011 operating budget and selected Alex Stedman to serve as the City's representative on the Grand Strand Water and Sewer Citizen Advisory Committee.

Business license renewals are due

When paying in City Hall, payments may be made by MasterCard, Visa, Discover, cash and by check. Credit card payments are also accepted in City Hall for building permits. Renewal Business Licenses will be issued once the application and payment is received in City Hall.

Officials expect citizens to keep their properties maintained, tended

In March, City of Marion officials sent a letter to affected property owners telling them that the City would no longer be maintaining the grass and overgrown weeds on parcels of privately owned properties within the city limits.

City Ordinance 10-02 was amended by council earlier this year and addresses, for health and sanitation reasons, the cutting of grass and the maintaining of personal real estate property.

Section 6-1009.1 of the Ordinance states that is unlawful for a property owner or occupant of a property to fail to cut grass, weeds and other overgrown vegetation when the height is more than one foot and that it is the duty of property owners and occupants to cut and remove all grass, weeds and other overgrown vegetation as often as is necessary to comply to the ordinance.

Vacant lots should be cut at least three times per year, or as required dur-

ing the growing season, April through September, the ordinance states.

If grass, weeds or vegetation grow beyond the one foot mark and the property is deemed a nuisance by the City's Code Enforcement Officer, notice will be served to comply with the ordinance.

When citizens do not comply with the ordinance, the city will charge the following rates to maintain the property according to code.

\$100 per lot, 1/2 acre or less \$175 per lot, 1/2 acre to 2 acres \$250 per lot, 2 acres to 5 acres

\$250 per lot, 5 acres and over, plus \$100 per hour, or designated contractor's cost that is billed to the city in addition to the cost of mailings.

Charges will appear as a lien on property and will appear on and be collected the same way property owners' municipal taxes are.

The group's annual fundraiser auction followed the annual meeting, raising about \$2,300 for the group's programs, events, etc. The group announced its membership drive is underway.

Also, board members and others gathered in the Main Street Marion office on June 16 for a workshop on economic restructuring, conducted by Main Street South Carolina's Beppie Legrand.

If you encounter our Mayor, a council member, or member of a community volunteer organization, thank them for making Marion the "trend setter!"


Without their help we all might be looking for a "small town community" to relocate to.

Sale of newly-created 'Steel Swamp Foxes' to benefit new center

The Francis Marion Initiative, comprised of a group of local educators, history lovers and reenactors, came before City Council on June 8 to present their idea for a Gen. Francis Marion Center.

Denley Caughman, a member of the Initiative and the Hugh Giles Regiment, Britton's Neck Militia, which operates under the auspices of Marion's Main Street Program, told council members that the new center, to be based in downtown Marion, will serve "as an anchor in the discovery of education and conservation of people, places, and events in the American Revolution.'

The Center will "make tangible our rich heritage to our students and educational community," Johnakin Middle School history teacher Wallace Foxworth, also a group member, told those present. The Initiative began meeting in February, following a meeting of citizens who discussed ways to "Jump Start" Marion's economy. Some members of the Initiative had previously worked with a group to present a program about the famed war hero on Gen. Francis Marion Memorial Day each February.

The work of that group and the "Jump Start" group was seen as compatible by city officials and the Initiative was born. Through Jump Start, several new ventures are in the works, city officials say, regarding things that may be brought to or developed in the city to advance its economy.

Francis Marion and his brigade provide a story that needs to be told, "a voice ready to be heard," Denley said. The Initiative believes a new Center will bring others to Marion in their pursuit of information about the General, whose troops and opponents lived and operated in this area. Those visitors will in turn bring money to local businesses.

The center is in the first stages of development and members of the state's Parks, Recreation and Tourism Department attended the meeting to show that group's support for the Initiative's efforts.

Funding is needed for the project. Toward that end, the Steel Swamp Fox, shown on Page 1, was created and is for sale, initially for \$25. The next run of the Swamp Foxes, which has a tag telling the story of Marion's namesake, will cost \$30 each. The first \$20 goes to pay for the cost of producing the keepsake and the rest of the money will go to help create the

The Steel Swamp Fox was created by Pete Rambo of www.themetalpalmetto.com. Each fox is hand-finished and each is unique. For an additional cost there is a heat-tempered version of the Swamp Fox for sale, too. For information about purchasing a Steel Swamp Fox, call Pam Jones in City Hall at 423-5961.
