City officials ask citizens to partner in resolving storm drainage issues

The City continues to work to resolve storm water runoff issues and is asking citizens to help in the efforts.

On Bobby L. Davis
Boulevard, the City is
cleaning trash out of
ditches to ensure proper
water flow following heavy
rains. Also, larger pipes
are being put in to carry
out flow from the ditch.
On Phillips Street, the City
is replacing a storm drain
line. Around Withlacoochee Park, the City is



redoing the existing pipe and installing a new 48-inch concrete pipe and new catch basins to help with drainage.

An underlying cause of some of the drainage has been littering, as shown above, Administrator Alan Ammons said. For instance, trash that is either thrown directly into a catch basin or onto the ground can be pushed into a catch basin during periods of heavy rain, which impedes the flow of water, clogs the catch basin, and creates flooding.

It's important to understand the connection between littering and the slow run off after heavy rains, city officials said. Also, some folks live in low-lying areas so run off is slower when rainfalls are heaviest. Below, city employees are shown working on Phillips Street.

Appropriately disposing of bottles and such and keeping up with balls and other toys left outside by children will help to ensure everyone's well-being, Ammons said. If a problem exists with a nearby catch basin, residents should call Ammons at 843-423-5961.





Farmer's Market brings fresh produce at good price

A second objective of the Marion Farmers Market and Marketplace, besides promoting healthy living and offering fresh, locally grown produce, is to attract people to Historic Marion.

According to Olde Towne Marion (HMRA) Executive Director Chuck Wiegert, the Market, in its second year, is satisfying both of those.

Debbie Erwin of Erwin Produce said "We sell stuff during the week as people call us for orders. Last week, we sold out of squash, so we had no squash. This week, we sold out of okra, so we won't have okra until next week. It all depends on what's available."



good price. A lot of the stuff you can find here is cheaper than in the stores," he said.

Additionally, "Our job is to bring people downtown to expose them to the businesses. So, by bringing the Farmer's Market and setting up, it turned out to be a good thing," he added.

Marion Farmers Market and Marketplace is open to the public 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. each Saturday through December. Last year, the Market was based in the old Coca Cola Plant. This year, it moved to the vacant lot on Marion Street.

Dan Shelley, another farmer at the Market, said the produce sold is based on what is available, a testament to the freshness of the products. "I grow all of this stuff, so whatever I got is what I bring. I pick this stuff on Friday morning or Saturday morning, so it's fresh. I try to have as much variety as possible."

While providing fresh produce and plants, as shown above, the Market also provides a place for social gathering and purchasing handcrafted items, such as jewelry.

Sanitation Department hires new employee

City approves \$5.5 million 2012-13 budget

At the City's June Council Meeting, Council approved the \$5.5 million 2012-13 budget for the City of Marion. The balanced budget does not require a millage increase.

Council also approved the hospitality tax revenues for the City of Marion for the upcoming fiscal year and agreed to continue using Kenneth Cobb & Co, PC, as the city auditor. They also approved the lowest bid for the purchase of a bush hog side cutter.

A topic of public comments during the

meeting was storm water runoff. A citizen spoke about the flooding issue on Bobby L. Davis Boulevard. During City Administrator Alan Ammons report, he highlighted other areas with flooding concerns in the city. Council recognized Ashley Williams, a recent graduate of the South Carolina School for the Deaf and the Blind, for her hard work in and out of school. Ordinance requires owners to upkeep lawns

According to the City's Health and Sanitation, Weeds and Vegetation Ordinance grass, weeds, or other overgrown vegetation higher than one foot on average is declared to be a nuisance.

The ordinance also states that any property owner or occupant of the property that allows the property to serve as a breeding place for trash and litter or as a fire hazard is to be declared a nuisance.

Any individual who fails to resolve the issue within 10 days of notice of non-compliance will be guilty of a misdemeanor.

The City may remove weeds, overgrown vegetation either by the use of a city crew or designated contractor and the cost will become a lien upon the property and collected in the same manner as municipal taxes.

The cost of such action by the city is as follows: \$100 per lot, ½ acre or less; \$175 per lot, ½ acre to 2 acres; \$250 per lot, 2 acres to 5 acres; \$250 per lot, 5 acres and over, plus \$100 per hour; or any contractor costs incurred by the city to correct the nuisance lot in addition to the cost of mailings.

If an owner or occupant of a property believes they are unable to pay to have the grass, weeds, or overgrown vegetation removed, he or she may ask the City of Marion for assistance. A voucher program, administered by a seven-member committee, is available for reviewing requests for assistance by low-income persons. Planning to play with fireworks for the 4th? Know the city's rules



The City of Marion's Fireworks Ordinance states that it is unlawful for anyone to possess, sell, offer for sale, store, transport, or use within the city, any fireworks that are not classified as ICC Class C "Common Fireworks."

It is also unlawful to explode or ignite fireworks within 600 feet of a church, hospital, asylum, or public school; to explode or ignite fireworks within 75 feet of where fireworks are stored, sold, or offered for sale; to ignite or discharge any permissible fireworks within or throw the same from any motor vehicle; and, to place or throw any ignited fireworks into or at any motor vehicle.

No fireworks of any kind shall be used, fired, shot, or discharged except from 5-11 p.m. on New Year's Day and the Fourth of July, and from 11 p.m. to 12:15 a.m. on New Year's Eve.
