City conveys water, sewer to GSWSA

In May, City of Marion officials put the final touches on the agreement to sell the city's water and sewer franchises and systems to the

Grand Strand Water and Sewer Authority. After months of negotiations, and a referendum vote of

Marion citizens with a nearly 3-1 margin in favor of the move, GSWSA purchased Marion's water and sewer system for \$13.6 million.

Of that purchase price, \$11 million paid off the city's water and sewer debt for those systems and \$2.6 million was paid directly to the city. Also, GSWSA will give Marion 7 percent of Marion's yearly operating revenue. At current rates, that is expected to be \$150,000 per year.

Marion residents will see their rates decrease to what they were before the last increase put in place by city council in August 2009 and GSWSA has agreed to not raise rates again in Marion until July 2012. The Authority's CEO, Fred Richardson, said the authority would keep all of the Marion city employees and that they would keep their same seniority and will not lose benefits.

City rentals: Fees apply

During the April City Council meeting, Mayor Rodney Berry suggested that the City maintain the current fee schedule for renting its facilities and maintain its liability policy.

Chamber News: Let's discuss Yard of the Month

Have you ever wondered how the Marion Chamber of Commerce Yard of the Month is selected?

Selections are made by a committee from the Garden Club Council. The committee is made up of anonymous representatives from each Garden Club and the president of the Council serves as the chair. The fifth member vote is used if there is a tie. The Marion area is divided into four sections and nominations are made within these sections on a rotating basis. The committee member responsible for the month's nominations selects three addresses, within the section, and calls the nominated addresses in to the chairman. The addresses are given to the other committee members and within a specified

time, committee members ride by and evaluate each of the nominated yards. Overall maintenance and curb ap-

peal, with priority to yards that are planned and maintained by the owners, help in the selection process. The committee calls back their vote to the chairman and the selection is made.

We appreciate and are thankful for the assistance of these committee members who so freely give of their time. Fire, Rescue to have fundraisers

Marion Fire and Rescue, which serves the citizens of Marion and those in the surrounding communities, is two separate organizations that work together to achieve a common goal.

The Marion City Fire Department and Marion Rescue Squad work seamlessly to improve public safety. Marion Rescue Squad responds to approximately 600 calls for service each year. This includes medical calls, fires, vehicle accidents, technical rescues, and marine rescues. The rescue squad is staffed with 45 volunteers, trained as emergency medical technicians, paramedics, and rescue technicians.

The Rescue Squad is an independent non-profit organization, funded through donations and governmental subsidies. It is the Rescue Squad's mission to provide the best possible technical rescue operations, emergency medical services, marine rescue operations, and disaster support. With its mission in mind, the Rescue Squad often has fundraisers.

The Rescue Squad is set to have two fund raisers, a portrait drive conducted by Volunteer Mail Service (VMS) and a raffle. VMS mails out a coupon for portraits and those who make a donation receive a free portrait. *Call* 423-8602 for more info.
