The City of Marion Recreation Department and the Marion County Boys & Girls Club have entered into an agreement for the Boys & Girls Club to use the Grice Recreation Center on Gurley Street.

Cost for children, ages 6-18, to join the Club is \$5 per year per child. For information about the programs, call Latoria Lewis, director, at 423-8623. Lewis is in the Center Monday through Friday, from 9:30 a.m.-noon and from 1-6:30 p.m.

According to Decar Brown, director of operations for the Boys and Girls Club in Florence, who is helping to oversee the new program in the county, a project of Marion County RALI, the programs offered to children will include character and leadership development.

Volunteers are needed to help with programs, Lewis said, adding that she needs folks willing to help with arts and crafts, to help in the games room and to assist with outdoor recreation for program participants. Brown told the Mayor and City Council members at their February meeting that club activities will be offered during the school year, but there isn't a plan in place now for summer programs.

## City to have council elections in April; Candidates signs should be on private property

The City of Marion General Election for Council seats in Districts 1, 2 and 4 and a Special Election to fill the open seat of District 5 will be on April 12.

Running unopposed and seeking reelection are Ralph Atkinson, District 1 and Bobby Davis, District 4. Loretta G. McGill is running against incumbent Ronald Atkinson for the District 2 seat. Odessa M. Gregg and Jerry Mitchell are running to fill the unexpired term of council seat for District 5. Former council member Poiette Bromell resigned her position earlier this year.

Precincts will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. To see where to vote, visit the Marion County Voter Registration and Election Commission at 137 Airport Court off East U.S. Highway 76 or call Teresa Moody or Tammy Barr at 423-8268.

Additionally, political signs may only be displayed on private property. City ordinances prohibit the placement of signs on public property, including the right of way.

Signs picked up for being improperly posted may be collected at the Marion Fire Department on Bond Street.

### City officials remind golf cart drivers to obey the rules of driving on roads

All residents are reminded to obey state and local laws concerning the operation of golf carts: have a valid South Carolina driver's license, have a permit from the state's Department of Motor Vehicles (\$5), have proof of insurance; and to only operate during daylight hours.

Parents who allow children to violate the laws shown below can be charged accordingly.

According to SC Section 56-2-100: A person operating a low speed vehicle must be at least 16 years old and have a valid driver's license. Section 56-3-115 further provides that the owner of a vehicle commonly known as a golf cart, if he or she has a valid driver's license, may obtain a permit from the department of motor vehicles upon the payment of a fee of \$5 and proof of financial responsibility which permits his agent, employees, or him to: (1) Operate the golf cart on a secondary highway or street within two miles of his residence or place of business during daylight hours only; and (2) Cross a primary highway or street while traveling along a secondary highway or street within two miles of his residence or place of business during daylight hours only.

"As a result, we are committed to offering programs that are flexible enough to accommodate the complexities that come with trying to earn a degree and support a family at the same time."


