Chamber honors local business owners; hears about efforts to change state's education system

The Marion Chamber of Commerce conducted its annual meeting on Jan. 27, announcing the winner of the 2013 Small Business Person of the Year award and the Chamber's Small Business of the Year.

Scott Baxley, representing Baxley's Hardware, the 2012 winner of the award, presented the 2013 award to Jimmy and Jamon Jordan of Jordan's Scrap Metal. The Jordan's were recognized for their support of community, outstanding customer service and civic-mindedness.

Ashley Brady, this past year's winner of the Chamber's Community Service Award presented the 2014 recognition to Craig Martin (CPA) for his roles in helping to better the community. The award carries a \$250 cash contribution, given by Pee Dee Federal Savings Bank in the name of the recipient to the charity of his or her choice.

Additionally, Judy Johnson was again recognized for her 18 years of service to the City and Chamber, upon the occasion of her retirement. The Marion Chamber seeks to foster the general development and welfare of the immediate surrounding area and works for business, industry, the professions, agri-business, and other civic interests, doing what no individual can do alone and performing services that benefit, directly or indirectly, all citizens, according to the group's mission statement.

President of the Chamber for 2014 is City Laura White. Cindy B. Rogers is the group's Executive Vice President. Vice President is T. Carroll Atkinson, III and Martin is Treasurer.

Guest speaker at the event was Pamela Lackey, co-chair of the state's TransformSC and AT&T South Carolina President. Lackey discussed with the group the need to transform the system of education the state operates under. TransformSC is an initiative of New Carolina (South Carolinas Council on Competitiveness).

The initiative is not about changing the funding sources for the state's education system, Lackey said, that's up to legislators. This movement is to create a new system of learning in the state. To date, only 36 schools in the state are using the group's approaches to education. The group advocates new learning models that include such items as personalized instruction rather than a "one size fits all" approach, the teacher as facilitator and not as lecturer, and a technology enabled learning experience.

Additionally, students need to master math and reading skills, learn how to locate information, expand critical thinking and problem solving skills and then communicate what they know to others. The initiative develops partnerships between parents, families, educators and others to change how children learn and apply their knowledge and is looking for more people to become involved in the program.
