# If it's May, it's time for Marion's FoxTrot Festival







The 19th annual FoxTrot Festival, which brings 20,000-25,000 visitors to Main Street, is set for Friday and Saturday, rain or shine, May 20-21.

Beginning with Friday night's movie and fireworks, the festival picks up again on Saturday morning with the 10 a.m. parade down Main Street and ends after Saturday evening's dance on Fox Field.

In addition to those activities, there will be the traditional antique tractor exhibit, pony rides, a petting zoo, two car shows and more for the crowds, festival organizers said recently.

Friday evening's movie, The Prince of Egypt, will be shown outdoors at 6 p.m. on Fox Field just off Bobby Gerald Parkway, and a professional fireworks display will follow. Fee is \$2 per person.

Vendors will begin setting up at 9 a.m. Saturday, downtown businesses will be open, there will be living history reenactors and the Friends of the Marion County Library has planned its annual book sale in the Records Building at the corner of Main and Godbold Streets.

New this year are a 40-foot ferris wheel that should allow riders to see

over the Main Street activities and a "water walking ball" for folks to enjoy. Featuring local and regional talent in 30-minute sets, the stage entertainment begins at noon.

The day's finale, a dance, will begin at 7 p.m. on Fox Field. The Holiday Band is the featured band for the Saturday night dance. Price is \$5 for those 25 and under and \$2 for those 26 and older. Concessions will be on sale and no coolers will be permitted. Attendees are encouraged to bring a lounge chair, blanket and their dancing shoes.



With all the great weather, yard sales will be popping up all over town. Remember to purchase your permit (\$3 per day) at City Hall Monday through Thursday.

No yard sale permits are issued on Fridays. Call Pam at 423-5961 if you have questions.


City Administrator and Building Official Alan Ammons said he is thrilled to add Vickie to the staff at City Hall.

# Relay for Life honors, remembers victims of cancer

The annual Marion County Relay for Life will begin at 6 p.m. Friday, May 13 in the city's Withlacoochee Park and continue until 6 a.m. Saturday, May 14. According to Chairman of the Marion County Relay for Life, Saundra Tindall, the Survivors' Walk will begin at 7 p.m. and the lighting of the luminary candles will be at 10 p.m. Tindall says she and her organizers are expecting a lot of food, games for children and the City of Marion Fire Department Puppets, entertainment from local talents and competitions among the teams.



According the Relay for Life website, the event "is a fun-filled overnight event designed to celebrate survivorship and raise money for research and programs of the American Cancer Society. During the event, teams of people gather at schools, fairgrounds, or parks and take turns walking or running laps.

Each team tries to keep at least one team member on the track at all times." Marion has about 14 teams and 229 team members involved in raising money this year.

# City to conduct annual clean-up first Saturday in June

According to City Administrator Alan Ammons the City of Marion's annual city-wide clean-up is set for Saturday, June 4.

On that morning, city sanitation workers will pick up all debris, junk, trash or otherwise unwanted stuff that has been placed by city residents on the street curb by 5 p.m. on Friday, June 3.

"You can leave your trash, unwanted junk, appliances, etc., and the city will pick it up and haul it off for you," he explained, saying this is residents' "oncea-year opportunity" to discard such unwanted items and to have them picked up and hauled off by city workers. ### Chamber's document shredding was a success



The Marion Chamber of Commerce had a successful "Shred Day" in April when Cintas came to the Baxley Hardware parking. According to Judy Johnson, the Chamber's executive vice president, the event was free, but donations were accepted to help with the Chamber's 2011 Education Programs. "We collected some donations for our programs," she said, adding that the event took in 13,000-plus pounds. "We had a nice turn out and lots of folks took advantage of the service. We were quite pleased and at one time thought we were going to run out of room in the truck ... We are already having people ask if we will be doing this again, so we take that as a good sign," she added. Cintas, a company that oversees the shredding and disposal of all types of documents, brought the shredder. This project was sponsored by chamber members Ashley Brady at First Charter Company and Stacy Smith at Wheeler Street Package.
