MARION COUNTY DAY HEALTH CARNIVAL AND JOB FAIR SET

Employees work hard to keep trash off the streets

The things we throw away! Keyboards, couches, tree limbs and broken chairs, with other household and yard items and yard debris are thrown out along the street curb at our houses and then they magically disappear. Disappear, that is, into the back of trucks.

And then, thanks to the city staff who work hard at driving and loading those trucks through our neighborhoods, our yard and home debris and clutter is taken away. And our streets and neighborhoods are left cleaned. According to Sanitation Department Superintendent Leonard "Winky" Fore, the city is divided into four routes and these men and their trucks start and run their routes repeatedly all week long.

And picking up discarded tires is still a no-no, he said. Citizens are always reminded to leave tires with the dealer who replaced them or to take them to the county's landfill, he said. Over the course of the day, according

to Fore, five truckloads carried away enough to fill four 30-yard containers. In a year, according to AWS, about 140 tons of commercial trash and 280 of residential trash is carted away.

On Monday mornings the sanitation crews begin their routes through the north end of the west side of town (Kimball Drive to Godbold Street), the south end of the west side (MLK Boulevard to Godbold Street), the north end of the east side (Rogers Road to Godbold Street), and the south end of the east side (Silver Trace Apartments to Godbold Street).

If citizens happen to place their debris street side after the truck is passed, Fore said, "Be patient. They'll be back for it. Remember, though, it depends on how much other debris is to be picked up along the route and hauled off before they can return."

Officers remind golf cart owners to obey rules of the roads, or face fines

Residents are reminded to obey state and local laws regarding driving golf carts. Drivers must have a valid South Carolina driver's license, have a permit from the state's Department of Motor Vehicles (\$5), and have proof of insurance.

Drivers also can only drive golf carts during daylight hours. Parents who allow children to violate the laws shown below will be charged accordingly, Marion Police Chief Jim Gray said. According to SC Code of Laws, Section 56-3-115, the owner of a vehicle commonly known as a golf cart, if he or she has a valid driver's license, may obtain a permit from the Department of Motor Vehicles upon the payment of a fee of \$5

and proof of financial responsibility which permits his agent, employees, or him:

(1) To operate the golf cart on a secondary highway or street within two miles of his residence or place of business during daylight hours only; and

(2) To cross a primary highway or street while traveling along a secondary highway or street within two miles of his residence or place of business during daylight hours only.

The fine for failing to have proper licenses, or driving after dark in the City of Marion, is \$237.50, according to Heather Evans, Marion Clerk of Court.

The \$237.50 fine also applies to the charge of "permitting unauthorized children to drive" and "permitting unauthorized persons to drive."
