Seminar for employers, about new policies regarding illegal aliens, is planned for Nov. 9 in the Marion Opera House

The state legislature has amended the South Carolina "Illegal Aliens and Private Employment" law to require that every employer verify new hires through the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system, beginning Jan. 1, 2012.

Employers who fail to comply can lose the right to operate their businesses. The South Carolina Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation (LLR) is charged with conducting random audits of employers to assure compliance. Jim Knight, Administrator for LLR's Office of Immigrant Worker Compliance, will conduct a seminar for Marion County employers on Wednesday, Nov. 9 at 10:30 a.m. in the Marion Opera House. Knight will address changes in the state immigration law, how to enroll in and use the E-Verify system, how LLR plans to enforce the law beginning Jan. 1, and the impact of illegal immigration on South Carolina communities.
