During the May City Council meeting, City Council members unanimously proclaimed September as Recreation Month in Marion and the third Saturday in September each year as **Play Day** in the City.

The proclamation was an affirmation that our city leaders encourage play outdoors and recognize the value of physical activity to a person's mental, physical and emotional wellbeing. In July, the City Council and Mayor approved spending money during the coming year to upgrade our city recreation department facilities and to put new playground equipment at Grice's Recreation Center, the park on Withlacoochee Avenue and at Tilghman Park.

Conducting a **PLAY DAY** is another way for the city to show its emphasis on play and recreation as a tool to achieve better overall health. Several events are in the planning stages and will be conducted in Withlacoochee Park from 10 a.m.- noon.

Volunteers are needed to help with the activities. Children of all ages are encouraged to come out for our first **PLAY DAY**. # Owner information helps 'lost' pets be returned home sooner

You drive the neighborhood, you post a notice, but you still haven't found your lost pet. Likely it has been 'found' by a neighbor, and is safe, not far from home.

However, if the pet's name and owner information is not on a tag on the collar, there may not be enough information to get the owner and pet reunited. For instance, though a pet has an ID chip implanted in an ear or a veterinarian's rabies number on a tag on the collar, if a pet is found on a Friday evening and the vet is unavailable, it may be Monday morning, before a pet and owner can be reunited.

Forty percent of households have pets, so it is inevitable that some will be "lost." Young, large dogs can run five miles or more in a short time and small dogs may run half a mile. Most pets are recovered within two miles of their home. With proper information, many can be returned home sooner.
