He began in the Sanitation Department and transferred to his current position at the Marion Recreation Department as custodian for our many recreation facilities and buildings in the fall of 2017. **Richard** is a great employee and a huge asset to the Marion Recreation Department. He is always kind, friendly and willing to help out wherever he can. Richard has been named "**Employee of the Month**" 3 times in the past five years and was recognized on each occasion by city officials for his strong work eth-

ic and positive attitude. His supervisor Kimberly Elliott stated, "What a true blessing Richard has been since he came on board with the Recreation Department. She added that he greets her with a smile every morning, he is always on time, and she never has to question whether his work for the day will be carried out. A-TEAM NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

"WE ARE OUR NEIGHBORS' KEEPERS"

We have all heard about the risks of identity theft. What we have probably never considered is what happens when a loved one dies. Nearly 800,000 people a year are targeted after death. Often our last tribute to a loved one is their obituary. Yet, the details we publish make their identities and their relatives vulnerable to identity thieves. With the information learned from an obit, a criminal can purchase or figure out a person's social security number. Once they have the social security number, they call apply for loans, file tax returns to get refunds, and open fraudulent credit card accounts. The first five digits of social security numbers are linked to the time and place of birth. Obits that list the names of grandchildren leave the surviving grandparent open to additional scams. Crooks will pose as grandchildren with sob stories of needing money. In the early days of this type scam, research found that all the victims had recent deaths with obits that listed the names of grandchildren. Remember less detail in the obituary will help avoid these scams. Report deaths to all three of the major credit reporting agencies, the Social Security Administration, IRS, insurers, etc. Also close down social media accounts. Eastern District Tournament



On Saturday, March 3, 2018, the Marion Recreation Department had the pleasure of hosting two District Tournaments for Basketball. Between the two tournaments, there were 16 teams represented, including Marion 8U and 12u boys. There were over 600 spectators in attendance throughout the day.

Teams in the 8U boys division were Marion, Florence, Chesterfield, Sumter, Aynor, Marlboro County, Mullins and Cheraw. Marion lost out in the first round to a tough Florence team. Florence went on to win the 8U Eastern District Division II Championship.

In the 12U boys division, competing were teams Marion, from Cheraw, Lake City, Latta, Dillon, Mullins, North Strand and Pawley's Island. Our 12U plowed through boys Cheraw, Lake City and Pawley's Island to become the 12U Eastern District Division II Champions. These guys moved on to the State Tournament.



Besides, the 8U and 12U boys, we also had 4 other teams competing in district tournaments at other facilities. Our 12U girls were in Latta, 14U boys were in Lake City and our 17U Boys were in Bucksport. Neither of these teams were successful in their championship birth; however, each coach and player represented Marion with the utmost respect.

Finally, our fourth team, 10U boys were competing in Aynor. They were able to take down Georgetown County, Latta, Lake City and Dillon in order to clinch their Eastern District II Championship. These guys moved on to the State Tournament.

In the Championship game, they over-came a deficit to clinch a 10 point victory over Bamburg. The Marion 12U boys basketball team was named Division II State Champions.

Congratulations to all these young men and their coaches. The Marion Recreation is so proud of them. They have all worked hard. There have been a lot of hours and dedication put in in order to claim these two titles.
