JOIN TRINITY BEHAVIORAL CARE IN THE FIGHT AGAINST OPIOID MISUSE



South Carolina has been hit hard by the opioid epidemic facing our nation. According to the South Carolina Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services (**DAODAS**), five mil-

lion opioid prescriptions are filled each year in South Carolina. That is more than one prescription per person in the state. Marion County is not exempt from this epidemic. In fact, it is one of the counties most affected. Currently, Marion County is in the top tier of counties in South Carolina experiencing opiate abuse and overdose deaths per capita. The problem is real, but the team at Trinity Behavioral Care has made immense strides in trying to prevent and reduce the impact of substance abuse and addiction in Marion County on the quality of life through the implementation of effective, efficient, meaningful, quality, primary Prevention, Intervention, and Treatment services.

In regards to Trinity's efforts to combat the opioid epidemic, they have implemented an opiate treatment program that was recently recognized by the South Carolina Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services (**DAODAS**) as a best practice model for rural communities and provided a \$130K expansion grant. In addition, the Prevention Department at Trinity continues to educate the community on how the opioid epidemic is affecting the county and ways to help reduce the problem. To assist in this effort, **DAODAS** just released a statewide media campaign called "Just Plain Killers" (<u>www.justplainkillers.com</u>) that seeks to disseminate information about opioid misuse across South Carolina.

Trinity Behavioral Care is asking for the citizens of Marion County to join in the fight against opioid misuse. One way to do that is to properly dispose of your old and unused prescription drugs. According to **DAODAS**, more than 70% of those abusing opioids admit to taking them from a friend or loved one who had a prescription. Therefore, it is imperative that we take appropriate action in preventing this. Here are several ways that

As one year ends and another begins, I have been reflecting on my year personally and also as chairperson of A-Team. It is not always easy to lead a group of such diverse people. We focus on what we have in common, not our differences. We strive to treat each other with respect and dignity. We have a unity of purpose. What unites us is our desire to live in a safe neighborhood where the quality of live is enhanced for our families and neighbors. The holidays are a busy time. It is easy to become overwhelmed. I have found myself questioning why I have undertaken this job as A-Team's leader. Through reflection, I have found the answer. I do this because I love my hometown and my neighborhood. I have lived in a four block radius my entire 58 years except for the 16 years I lived out of state. Leading A-Team is not a thankless task. Over the last month signs have gone up on Woodland Dr. and all the residents have received letters about dumping in the grassy area between the divided streets. Those concerns found their voice at our meetings. We have affected change. This may seem a strange concern for neighborhood watch. It is not. Research shows there is a direct link between pride in your neighborhood and crime rates. That is why we call ourselves Neighborhood Watch not Crime Watch. The greatest gift I receive from A-Team is the opportunity to really know my neighbors. Because of A-Team my life is enriched by people like Tyrone and Daisy Collins. While Tyrone battled cancer, he set a wonderful example of commitment to our common purpose. His support of our efforts and me personally never waivered. During his cancer battle, he found the strength to attend most all meetings and events. Tyrone was a gracious, soft-spoken man devoted to his family and friends. Unfortunately, we lost Tyrone over Christmas. I feel honored to have called him my friend. All of A-Team send our condolences to Mrs. Daisy and all of the Collins Family. We are glad his pain has ended, but he will be missed. A-team meetings and events will never be the same. So my reasons for being involved with A-Team are really about love. Love for Marion and love for its people. A-Team has seen me through my journey with breast cancer. They have been a valuable part of my support system just like my family. No one journeys through cancer alone. As important as the doctors and medicine, are the support a person receives from their family and friends. I have been so fortunate to have my son and daughter-in-law and little Savannah. They walked every step with me along with my parents and sister. A-Team was there too. They gave me purpose and something to focus on other than myself. As 2017 ends and 2018 begins, I am feeling grateful and blessed. Grateful and blessed to be part of my family, my neighborhood and my town. Take time to count your blessings. After three years, I have come to count even my cancer journey as a blessing. you can dispose of your old and unused prescription drugs:

*<u>DROP THEM</u>: You can take your old and unused medications to the Prescription Drug Drop Box located inside the Marion County Law Enforcement Center / Sheriff's Department at 2715 East Highway 76 in Mullins (near Walmart).

*<u>TOSS THEM</u>: Mix (don't crush) your old and unused medications with cat litter or used coffee grounds. Put this mixture into a sealed container, such as a plastic bag or a coffee can, and throw it away. Not all medications can be disposed of using this method. To see if this method is appropriate, call the FDA at their toll-free number: (855)-543-3784.

*If you get your prescription drugs from the Walmart Pharmacy, they will give you drug deactivation bags to properly dispose of old and unused medications. Instructions for disposal are on the bag.
