

Fire Prevention Week

This year Slogan was "Look. Listen. Learn. Be Aware. Fire can happen anywhere."

On October 9, 2018, the City of Marion Fire Department celebrated Fire Prevention Week. The crew kicked things off with a special presentation at the fire station, inviting and transporting more than 200 children from local daycares. Assistant Chief Jackie Yates spoke to the children about the importance of fire prevention. The children were treated to snacks and enjoyed a fun and educating puppet show. Firefighters also traveled to several schools to help educate the youth.

Assistant Chief Jackie Yates said the education through characterization program is part of the National Fire Prevention Week activities. Established by the Nation Fire Protection Association the first full week in October, Fire Prevention Week is held across the nation. "It gives local fire departments the opportunity to bring kids into the station or go out to the local schools and teach the kids about fire safety," he said. "Not only do we target kids, we're trying to teach adults as well."

"Because they see adults using fire all the time, children don't know that they can't do that or control it," Yates said. "This is a good opportunity to reach them because kids will listen to puppets sing those songs because kids learn through songs. These traditions are very effective."

Yates said the department has showcased the puppet show for more than a decade. "It's called the City of Marion puppet show and our slogan is saving lives through education," Yates said. "I have kids that come up to me in high school now that remember me with the puppets and we know if they remember I came to the school with the puppets, then they remember the message.

This year because of the storm and kids just getting back to school they only visited Marion Intermediate. In the past they usually also visited Easterling Elementary and Springville Head Start in Marion.

Helping Hands Free Clinic

Helping Hands Free Medical Clinic (HHFMC) has received the Choose Well Grant from the New Morning Foundation for 2018. The goal of Choose Well is to provide contraceptive methods to patients regardless of their ability to pay for them. Through this grant, HHFMC is offering contraceptive implants (Nexplanons) and intrauterine devices (IUD's) at no charge to patients. HHFMC had a successful Women's Health Open House at our Mullins site on August 27, 2018.

There are two nurse practitioners at HHFMC, Ms. Schinitra Swinney and Dr. Tracy George. Dr. George has a special interest is in women's health and inserting contraceptive devices.

- FEMA representatives and inspectors from other agencies will always have identification.
- Do NOT give cash. Government workers never ask for a fee or payment.
- Do NOT give personally identifiable information over the phone.

BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT: Jordan Scrap Metal, Company Inc.

Jordan Scrap Metal, Company Inc. was incorporated in 1948; however, the business was established in the 1930's. President of the company is Jimmy Jordan, with Jamon Jordan serving as vice president. Jordan Scrap Metal is one of the oldest businesses in Marion with over 70 years on the books and has continued to grow over 4 generations. They recycle scrap metal, as well as buy recyclable metals.

The family enjoys doing business in the town they've grown up in.

The family business was officially started as Jordan Scarp Metal, Inc. in 1948 when James Jordan purchased the land on Manning Street. They built a small one room wooden building with a set of heavy scales on one side of it. This land was purchased with money my father saved during his service during WWII. While stationed in Europe, he sent most of his paycheck home every month to his mother to deposit in a saving account. By the time the war ended and the returned home, he had enough in savings to purchase the land and building and office on Manning Street, Norford Jordan, Sr. had operated a scrap metal and hides, and fur business out of his backyard on Pine Street in Marion. People brought him scrap metal, cow hides, and small animal furs for him to purchase, and then ho would take them to manufacturers and different businesses to sell. He also went around in his vehicle at the time to search for and purchase items from individuals and businesses to sell. Before the war, James often accompanied and assisted him with this.

Sometime in the 1950's as the business grew, a warehouse and connected office were built next door to the original wooden office as they expanded and added more land. The businesses were officially known as Jordan Scrap Metal Co. and Jordan Hide and Fur. The formed the two separate divisions of Jordan Scarp Metal, Inc. The two businesses continued to expand. At the time there were railroad tracks running through Marion and the majority of the scrap metal was shipped by rail. In 1964, the business was moved to its current location at 123 Metal Road because there was still access to the trains at that time and more land was needed. Since this move, the business has continued to grow and change. There is no longer a Hide and fur Division, trucks are now use instead of trains and the scrap metal business has continued to evolve. Three years ago, Jordan Scrap Metal, Inc. expanded into the roll-off trash business along with business partner, Charlie Richburg. This company is called Jordan Waste. One thing is that has remained constant throughout the years for the entire Jordan family us that regardless of location, business focus, or current owner, there has always been a strong feeling of the need to give back and community service.
